Native Women's Equal Pay Day, September 8, 2021

As reported by national AAUW, September 8 marked the date "that Native women have to work into the new year to finally reach equal pay from the previous year. Native women experience one of the most harmful pay gaps: taking home, on average, 60 cents to every dollar white, non-Hispanic men make. But as a notoriously understudied group, more research and data are needed. ... We do know that Native women face high rates of systemic violence, poverty & healthcare disparities, all compounding a gender pay gap that endangers their economic security during a global crisis."
