# **Showing of NOVA Documentary** *Picture a Scientist*

*Picture a Scientist* provides insight into the challenges and barriers still faced by women in the STEM fields. Its title asks viewers, "When you picture a scientist, who do you see?" Many would say an Albert Einstein-like figure: male, white, privileged, and older. Science may indeed be one of the areas where the glass ceiling has yet to be shattered, bolstered by centuries of downplaying, ignoring, or silencing the contributions of women and minorities. Here in Duluth women scientists face discrimination and marginalization. The branch needs to support them.

### **Duluth Branch Nominee Wins State Award !!**

Many congratulations to NATALIE MILLER, high school level winner of the 2022 Minnesota State Young Women for Equity Award. This \$500 award recognizes and rewards a young woman whose projects, activities, and leadership address equity issues.

NATALIE MILLER, who graduated from East High School in spring 2022 and is headed to Yale this fall, describes herself as "a social science geek" who wants to pursue a college major that helps her "to advocate for human rights and social justice." After graduation, she hopes to attend law school to become a civil rights or NGO attorney.

Her passion for historical research resulted in 1st place at National History Day for her 2020 Senior paper, "Too Strong for a Woman: How Bernice Sandler Created Title IX to Break Barriers for Female Faculty in Higher Education." She's also won a Yale Book Award, a Youth Civic Engagement Scholarship, and was a 2021 AP Scholar.

#### National AAUW Statement on Overturning Roe v. Wade

"AAUW strongly condemns the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization. The decision overturns the landmark Roe v. Wade ruling that established abortion as a constitutionally protected right nearly 50 years ago and ignores the will of the American people, 80% of whom support legal abortion.

AAUW believes everyone has the right to make decisions about their own reproductive lives without government interference. Abortion access is vital to women's ability to control their lives, bodies and futures. Without reproductive freedom, there can be no equity.

Being able to choose whether and when to become a parent improves women's well-being and fosters economic security—a crucial component of AAUW's mission. This is particularly important in a country that lacks accessible maternal health care, paid caregiving leave and workplace protections for pregnant workers.

The Court's decision hurts all of us, but it will do the most harm to low-income people, women of color, immigrants, people with disabilities and LGBTQ+ people, because these groups already face substantial barriers to accessing reproductive services and health care.

While the Court's decision is a major setback for all Americans, AAUW remains steadfast in our commitment to protecting reproductive rights, a vital component of gender equity."

### Sue Monk Kidd, *The Book of Longings* (2020)

**One October morning** in 2014, Sue Monk Kidd was inspired "to write a story about the fictional wife of Jesus." Audacious, controversial, tricky? You bet. But the idea took hold and within minutes her character had the name Ana. That day, too, Kidd realized that like many historically silenced women, what her character wanted most was a voice. Thus the novel is told in the first person by Ana herself: a willful, educated, artistic, rebellious woman who is not only Jesus' wife but his partner. Indeed, Kidd gives Ana "her own quest—that of following her longings in pursuit of the largeness inside herself."

The Book of Longings also reimagines the single celibate Jesus of the New Testament as even more fully human than before.

Meticulous historical research undergirds the compelling plot, though Kidd takes some fictional license, such as making Judas Ana's adopted brother.

The A P review calls the novel "an epic masterpiece . . . of insight and storytelling" and a great Book Club choice.
