

Diversity Officer's Pick: C. M. Surrisi, *The Bones of Birka* (2023)

In the late nineteenth century, the most significant Viking tomb ever, "Bi 581." was excavated on the Swedish island of Birka. Inside, archeologists found a collection of weapons and a game board used for battle strategy. These contents revealed that the grave belonged to an important warrior who was assumed to be male. But in 2017, DNA testing confirmed that the body was female, leading to controversy and

challenging established assumptions about gender roles and the gender spectrum during the Viking Age. The osteologists (people who study bones) and other scientists making the radical claim of a female Viking warrior were women.

Minnesota-based author C. M Surrisi interviewed these Swedish women scientists—plus their critics—for her Young Adult book *The Bones of* Birka: Unraveling the Mystery of a Female Viking Warrior.

Surrisi hopes to draw attention to "gender archeology," that is, how contemporary biases (e.g., sexism) affect interpretations of the past. A grave full of weapons does not necessarily mean that its occupant was male any more than one full of cooking utensils means its occupant was female. Unbiased science must prove it.
