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

"Equality under the law shall not be abridged or denied by this state or any of its cities, counties, or other political subdivisions on account of race, color, creed, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, age, disability, ancestry, or national origin."

MN AAUW supports the passage of the MN Equal Rights Amendment because: 1) It will constitutionalize Minnesota's Human Rights Act, the strongest in the country, and protect it from future legislative change, and 2) It will give unquestioned legal foundation to the fight to end sexual violence against women, especially in cases of domestic violence.

## Diversity Officer's Pick: *Homegoing*, by Yaa Gyasi (2016)

Yaa Gyasi was born in Ghana but raised in Huntsville, Alabama, after her parents immigrated to the USA. Her teachers encouraged her to believe that her "dream of becoming a writer was not only possible, but a foregone conclusion."

This confidence is fully realized in *Homegoing*, (2016), which *The New York Times* reviewer called "a hypnotic debut novel." An international bestseller, the novel won

the National Book Critics Circle John Leonard Prize and the PEN/Hemingway award for a first novel.

Homegoing begins in 18th-century Ghana and follows two half sisters down six generations. Effia the Beauty marries an Englishman, and she and her son live comfortably in Cape Coast Castle. Her descendants survive centuries of warfare and colonization in Ghana. Effia does not realize that her sister, Esi, is

imprisoned in the castle's dungeons and then shipped to America as a slave. Esi's descendants confront plantation life, the Civil War, the Great Migration, and modern American life. The book blurb aptly states, "Homegoing makes history visceral, and captures . . . how the memory of captivity came to be inscribed in the soul of a nation." You need to read this epic, lyrical, moving work.
