Below is the inaugural column from the Branch's new Diversity Officer, Linda LeGarde Grover:

I recently watched "Mrs. America" (FX Hulu, 2020), which is a 9-part series about the 1970s movement to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment and the backlash against the ERA led by Phyllis Schlafly, founder of the Eagle Forum. Both camps were well represented with news footage and fictionalized behind-the-scenes interactions of both the ERA supporters and those who opposed it (and their reasons). Watching was experiencing a snapshot of history interwoven with the present.



The series included Shirley Chisholm's run for the Democratic 1972 presidential nomination, which intersected with the women's liberation movement and the ERA. I was able to meet Ms. Chisholm and shake her hand not long before the convention. She took her time as she thanked me for being there as she gently squeezed my hand; I felt awed, encouraged, and hopeful. And I remember her smile.

Netflix has recently (March 2024) released a biographical film, *Shirley.* that focuses upon Ms. Chisholm's presidential nomination run. The film is an hour and 57 minutes in length. I will want to see this. Might there be a watch party in the Duluth Branch's future?

ERA Minnesota Latest ERA Updates from Public Policy Chair, Jackie Falk

We ended the 2024 legislative session exhausted and a bit bruised but satisfied that, with our allied partners, we accomplished a lot. We came much closer to the finish line than ever before, even though time ran out for a final vote in the Senate. However, we are a resilient bunch and are already launching plans for the next session. The attention Minnesota (and other states pursuing constitutional amendments) bring to bear on the critical importance of states' actions post-Dobbs is crucial. Our biggest accomplishment was passing an inclusive ERA through both the MN House and Senate in the same biennium, albeit with some differing language. In 2023 the ERA passed through the Senate 43 -23 using the Nevada language. In 2024 ERA passed through the House with robust and inclusive language that included reproductive language. We greatly expanded our coalition of state players, which we continue to build on. We are working to persuade allied organizations to list the ERA as their top legislative priority. The ERA received unprecedented press coverage statewide and nationally. Minnesota's major publication's editorial board came out publicly and said the voters should decide. On a grassroots level, we experienced huge growth in the numbers of activists who were too large and too loud to ignore. Thank you, Branch members, for sending messages to legislators and attending rallies!

Zabelle's Book Pick: *The Friend*, by Sigrid Nunez (2018)

The Wall Street Journal describes this slim volume as "a beautiful book.... A world of insight into death, grief, art, and love," while the NPR reviewer judged it to be "a penetrating, moving meditation on loss, comfort, memory."

Sigrid Nunez's book won the 2018 National Book Award for Fiction and stayed on the New York Times bestseller list for weeks.

Whatever your notions of

friendship, this novel is likely to dislodge them because in this case the friend is not a person , , , but a dog.

You might think that such a story is bound to be sentimental and cliched, but you'd be wrong. It's witty, wry, and anything but lightweight.

To pique your interest, here is an excerpt from the publisher's blurb: "When a woman unexpectedly loses her lifelong best friend and mentor, she finds herself burdened with the unwanted dog he has left behind. Her own battle against grief is intensified by the mute suffering of the dog, a huge Great Dane traumatized by the inexplicable disappearance of its master."

Sigrid Nunez's fiction and non-fiction have garnered countless top literary awards. Her latest novel is *The Vulnerables* (2023).
