107 Days, by Kamala Harris (Simon & Schuster, 2025)

Looking forward to September 23, the release date for Kamala Harris's new book 107 Days, I arrived at The Bookstore at Fitger's while the booksellers were getting ready to put them out on the shelf. I bought the one at the top of the pile and began to read when I got home. As I write this I am nearly halfway through; I am enjoying and appreciating Harris's sharing her experience as the Democratic candidate for the office of President of the United States during the summer and early fall of the 2024 election season. However, there is much more to the story, and to Kamala Harris: Her family is extended, their lives interwoven with America's history and current milieu, and her sisters, nieces and aunties very much like mine. That sisterhood parallels that of Kamala's sorority Alpha Kappa Alpha, one of the Divine Nine, the Greek organizations formed during segregation. Harris's description of her speech at the annual Zeta Phi Beta gathering in Indianapolis is vivid, illuminating and moving to read.

## **Public Policy Highlights from Branch PP Liaison, Jackie Falk**

LOCAL LEVEL: In 1991 National AAUW published the "How Schools Shortchange Girls Report." Our branch requested and analyzed the data from ISD 709. Analysis showed that while 6th-grade girls outperformed 6th-grade boys on their math achievement tests, boys significantly outnumbered girls in the 7th-grade advanced math classes. We spoke up and met the moment then. President Angela George now invites us to again meet the moment in this anti-DEI climate with creative solutions. Join her when you are invited.

STATE LEVEL: Betty Folliard told me ERA MN expanded to create a new coalition called Minnesotans for Equal Rights and will hold a big rally on the first day of the session, 2/17/2026, at 1 pm, in the state Capitol Rotunda. A Zoom workshop by the Hawaii branch clarifies that our state protections are our best opportunity. Betty says, "We're in a challenging time politically in this state, [but] we won't stop till we have an equal rights amendment."



## Zabelle's Book Pick: *Heartwood*, by Amity Gaige (2025)

Amity Gaige is the author of four previously much lauded novels, two of which were New York Times notable books in the years they were published and which won other awards. Her new novel, Heartwood, promises to earn just as many accolades. Author Jennifer Egan judged it "Impossible to put down." Now that I have read it, I agree.

On the one hand, Heartwood is a thriller about a hiker lost in the Maine woods while trying to traverse the Appalachian Trail. So on this level, it is "an inspiring wilderness survival tale," according to another reviewer. But it also concerns the complex mother-daughter bonds of its three main characters, through whose viewpoints the storyline proceeds. In the end, all three characters converge as the mystery is finally solved.

The lost hiker is Valerie Gillis, whose trail name is Sparrow, a nurse thoroughly burned out from her experiences during Covid. While hiking, she comes to terms with how she has idealized her mother and whether she can save her faltering marriage. Lieutenant Bev from the Maine Warden Service is in charge of the statewide search for Valerie. She too is in the process of finding herself and forgiving her mother's frailties. Then there is Lena, whose daughter has cut off communication with her. Lena is an amateur naturalist in an assisted living facility, who loves nothing more than to forage in the surrounding woods, even though she has mobility issues.
